

## Consumer Price Index

February 2016

### OVERVIEW

Information released today by Statistics Canada indicates that the Yellowknife All-Items Consumer Price Index in February rose 2.0% compared to one year ago. By comparison, the annual price increase was 1.4% for Canada, 1.3% for Edmonton, and 1.3% for Whitehorse.

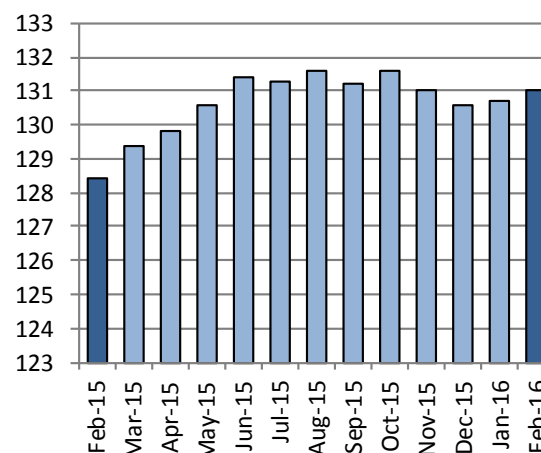

Compared to February 2015, consumer prices increased in Yellowknife for most major components with the exception of shelter and health & personal care. Higher prices for food (6.2%) and clothing & footwear (6.2%), were offset by lower prices for fuel oil and other fuels (-19.9%) and gasoline (-13.1%).

As the graph shows, month over month prices have been relatively stable since June 2015. Between January and February 2016 there was a 0.2% increase in Yellowknife. Contributing to this monthly change were price increases for food and recreation, education and reading. The price for energy products, which includes gasoline, fuel oil and other fuels, decreased 4.4% between January and February 2016.
